MESSAGE FROM CEO

2020 - OUR COVID STORY

2020 was a year like no other and probably the most challenging year we have ever faced in our history. We started 2020 full of joy and anticipation for the year ahead, looking forward to implementing our plans for growth.

On March 1st 2020 we were kindly gifted a child development centre to take over in Clones, Co Monaghan by Eavan & Philip Rooney. We were full of hope for the future with the opening of our fourth provincial child development centre in Clones, Co Monaghan. We were looking forward to building on the growth of our recently opened centre in Mayo as well as growing the supports available from our centres in West Cork and Kildare, on which so many families depended for vital therapeutic supports for their children.

Then, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, suddenly on 12th March 2020, the government shut all schools, colleges, and childcare facilities, which naturally caused a lot of distress for families. On 24 March 2020, almost all businesses, venues and amenities were shut including our therapy services. We suddenly were left with many unprecedented challenges. Just like every other organisation, in the country, it was a stark situation, but particularly so, for non-profit organisations like us. Initially, I did wonder how we were ever going to survive this. Sudden and unprecedented loss of income whilst having the same fixed overheads to meet is a nightmare scenario for any organisation.

Over the next 3 months whilst our therapy services were closed for face-to-face appointments, we found a healthcare compliant platform to deliver telehealth for children, which was availed of by some families. Due to the nature of the challenges of the children we support, we found that telehealth was not always suitable. There really is no substitute for face-to-face therapy in our sensory integration gyms for these children where they can get the sensory input and regulation that they need.

During that time, we also had to make extremely tough decisions that we never thought we would ever have to make, by laying off or reducing working hours for our much-valued employees who had given so much to Sensational Kids. This situation resulted in some of the therapy team taking up employment with the HSE in response to their recruitment call out for healthcare professionals. It was a very difficult time for all concerned.

MESSAGE FROM CEO

Throughout the entire year we kept our phonelines open. Our receptionists worked tirelessly in their usual friendly and professional manner with great empathy for families. We were able to safely keep our online shop running as an essential provider of vital educational and therapeutic resources. During the lockdowns our online shop became an essential resource for parents who were home-schooling their children. Our retail team worked tirelessly throughout this time to keep this essential service going. I am very thankful for their continued dedication, endless positivity, and energy. You are an inspiration to us all.

After 3 months of enforced closure, our child development centres, were deemed an essential service and could reopen. Our team worked closely with a health & safety consultant, funded by Kildare Local Enterprise Office, to put Covid management policies in place to allow us to safely open. There are many other organisations that helped, such as local county councils who gave grants for covid management equipment for which we are very grateful. The Community Foundation for Ireland provided much valued financial support by stepping in to support our centre in Monaghan to enable it to continue to provide essential services there.

I know the families and children were very glad to be allowed back into our centres for therapy again. It was a very emotional time with some parents bursting into tears when they walked through our doors again in June. Our therapists reported that many of the children, particularly those with autism, had regressed during the period of enforced closure. I, like many, hope never occurs again.

From June, our team continued to provide essential frontline therapy supports whilst juggling the constant change and often seemingly never-ending challenges such as managing Covid-19 symptoms, dealing with close contacts, lockdowns, restricted movements, extra paperwork, extra sanitisation, and cleaning. I want to pay tribute to the trojan work and effort of our entire team so that we could keep our services open safely to support children who needed our specialist frontline services.

We are truly grateful to the government for their financial assistance through the Stability Fund and Wage Subsidy Scheme. Without their support, we simply could not have survived the financial impact of the Covid-19 pandemic. It was a vital lifeline to enable us to continue to meet our fixed costs and overheads of our four national facilities at a time when our earned and fundraised income had virtually disappeared.

Successes to celebrate in 2020 too, including continuing with our plans to complete Phase 2 of the development of our Child Development Centre in Mayo, the opening of Sensational Kids in Clones, securing The Growth Fund from Rethink Ireland and putting plans in place to custom build a National Child Development Centre and HQ, which is our most ambitious plan to date.

MESSAGE FROM CEO

There are so many people who work tirelessly behind the scenes at Sensational Kids. I want to highlight and thank our voluntary board of directors and voluntary board sub-committee members who had a very busy and challenging year in 2020. Volunteers don't always have the time - nobody does - but they do have the heart - and that is why they gift their time and expertise to making a difference to the lives of children. I want to say a huge thank you to the chair of the board of directors Maurice Kelly who led our board throughout our most challenging year ever. The role of the chair is a big ask for anyone to take on at any time, let alone during a global pandemic, but Maurice always steers us through with professionalism and ease, ensuring our board meetings are progressive, challenging, and enjoyable and for that I know we are all very grateful. Giving back is both a privilege and an opportunity. It is by giving back that we become more. I trust that you all already know that you make a difference and will remember that you are more because of it.

Without doubt, 2020 has been a year of significant and unprecedented challenges. I feel very fortunate to receive support and guidance from our voluntary board of directors, our board sub-committees, from Rethink Ireland and from the many consultants who work with us through The Growth Fund. We are hugely grateful to our generous funders and donors without whom, Sensational Kids would simply not exist.

I really want to thank all our team, who stuck with us throughout the year and who provided vital and essential support to so many children and families during the pandemic. I am so privileged to lead and facilitate an amazing group of people whose commitment to helping children has been highlighted more than ever during 2020. As I write this now in summer 2021, I feel grateful to have steered our way through 2020 with the support and help of so many people and organisations who played an essential role in our 2020 Covid story.

I know that our 2020 story is one of resilience and growth. Not only did we survive 2020 but we have hope again, and we have plans to thrive in the future. And for that I am grateful. I also know that when you are grateful, fear disappears, and anything is possible.



The Vision, mission and values of Sensational Kids are intrinsically linked and are driven by the objective of making a real difference to those children who require early intervention with specific additional needs.








Waiting lists




Fig. 1 — Service users by year Source: Management Information

How Sensational Kids' Responded to the Pandemic

Like most organisations, 2020 for Sensational Kids was about survival during a global pandemic but it is also a story of resilience and hope for the future. In 2020, Sensational Kids found a way of adapting the way in which the organisation does things to continue to provide vital therapeutic services for the children and families that rely on its services.

The organisation was in a period of rapid growth in early 2020, having recently opened its third Child Development Centre in Claremorris, Co. Mayo and having opened its fourth centre in Clones, Co Monaghan on 1st March 2020, which was kindly gifted by Eavan & Philip Rooney. The organisation was poised for increasing capacity in all four centres and growing its impact across Ireland. Unfortunately, Covid-19 reached Irish shores in early 2020 and by mid-March, the outlook was not so positive.

From March 24th 2020, the doors of Sensational Kids, like so many organisations were mandated to close. Fundraising opportunities and traded income vanished overnight while the cost of overheads remained the same and the future of Sensational Kids was in severe jeopardy.

The amazing team at Sensational Kids rallied and found new ways to support the families and children that rely on its services. Telehealth services were developed and offered, and many families availed either for the children directly or for parent consultations to help develop and implement a home therapy programme to support children with additional needs during an exceptionally stressful time. The therapy team also created a wealth of tutorial videos to provide therapeutic guidance and to help support even more families through Sensational Kids' social media and online channels. After the initial three-month closure, Sensational Kids was deemed an essential service and could reopen. With the assistance of a health and safety consultant, strict Covid-19 policies were put in place to allow therapy services to operate once again.

Since June 2020, Sensational Kids' therapy services have remained open, thanks to the amazing team, welcoming families from across Ireland and supporting them during an exceptionally difficult and stressful year.

Despite the significant impact and challenges of the pandemic, Sensational Kids was able to weather the financial storm thanks to the financial support of the Irish Government. The team at Sensational Kids adapted and rallied to support the families who attend its services and emerged as a hybrid workforce with some employees working remotely where possible and others deemed essential workers who continued as frontline workers providing vital supports to children and families.

Luckily Sensational Kids adapted quickly and were enabled to host an online Handwriting Without Tears Workshop in the Autumn of 2020 which attracted healthcare workers, teachers, SNAs and parents from Ireland, the UK and further afield.



Rethink Ireland Awardees



In 2020, Sensational Kids became the third organisation to receive investment from the Rethink Ireland Growth Fund. Sensational Kids was awarded €550,000 over a period of two years in growth capital to provide 12,000 therapy supports to 2,000 children in 2021. The growth capital is broken into cash grants and non-financial supports to deliver the goals and targets for the investment period.

The investment is supported by Sensational Kids partners with match funding from the Growth Fund. The Growth Fund is supported by the Department of Rural and Community Development from the Dormont Accounts Fund. It invests in established social innovations that have completed a six-month Accelerator Programme and are ready to secure significant growth capital to achieve scale and deepen their impact.

The funds from Rethink Ireland will be used to expand and grow the number of timely and affordable supports that Sensational Kids provides for children with additional needs across Ireland.

My little son JC was diagnosed with autism just before last Christmas", explains Laura. "When he first started here in Sensational Kids he had 5 words, but he only used three: 'Mama', 'Dada' and 'No', but mostly just 'No'. Before we came here it was tantrums. I'd never understand what he wanted.

We came to Sensational Kids and theu started working with him using the Picture Exchange Communication System (PECS) which allowed him to communicate using pictures. He practically flew at it when he realized he could convey not only what he wanted, he could actually express his preferences and choices. It gave him the initiative to communicate. The tantrums went to practically zero. Then the vocabulary started to come. Today, thanks to Sensational Kids, JC is up to nearly 100 words".



Aisling

My little girl in her autism spectrum disorder report at the age of four, had 3 or 4 words, no grammar structure and was unable to construct a sentence. She had no reciprocal speech, poor intonation, and her speech patterns were distorted. My little girl could not talk, gave no eye contact and could not communicate properly; as I drove her in our car, I would adjust my rear view mirror so she could not see the tears streaming down my face. Heartbroken does not come close to describing those

difficult years.

Her personality has unleashed. She is a bouncy, energetic 6 year old that is happy, confident and connected with her world. Aisling is living a full and happy life - because of Sensational Kids.

Our little girl is a permanent resident of Sensational Kids; she has gone to speech therapy, occupational therapy and hippotherapy. And now? Our little girl is reading, writing, she has formed relationships with school friends and is loving life. She does not only speak now, but does monologues in why icecream is very important to her!

Alan

"Mu son speaks with confidence now." Six-year-old Alan from **Dublin attended Speech** & Language Therapy at Sensational Kids for seven months to work on certain speech sounds that he had been struggling to pronounce.

Alan's mother was concerned about his speech sounds but also Alan's shyness and the fact he struggled to speak up and make friends. "Other children would say hi and Alan wouldn't respond as he was afraid to talk.

Since starting Speech Therapy at Sensational Kids, Alan's confidence has grown. His class teacher has even remarked on the changes and has said Alan now puts his hand up in class and speaks with confidence. Alan's mum says Alan talks to everyone now and has lots of friends.

Raphael

Raphael has been attending Sensational Kids for the past five years as he is on the Autism spectrum and needed help to self-regulate and communicate. Raphael attends both Occupational Therapy and Speech and Language Therapy at Sensational Kids.

Raphael's mum has learned tips and tools on how to pre-empt and manage situations where Raphael would feel overwhelmed. "Our therapists at Sensational Kids have taught me many things including how to use Raphael's pressure points to help him calm down, if he was feeling overwhelmed. Sometimes even a hug at the right moment was all that was needed to help Raphael. Raphael used to break everything out of frustration, my wall, my phone, the DVD player, everything.

He is a different child now and our lives are so much easier. We can go out. It used to be impossible to get Raphael into the car but now he loves going on family outings. Raphael's communication skills have also greatly improved. He now understands everything and has many words. We are currently working on his language structure.



Business Model

Sensational Kids' innovative social enterprise business model utilises four traded income streams to facilitate the provision of a high quality and affordable child development therapies.

The trading income earned allows Sensational Kids to offer a standard subsidised rate for our services, but children are never turned away from services for financial reasons. We also facilitate lower scaled rates based on whatever the families can afford to pay, thereby making clinical services accessible to all children, regardless of financial means.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

OPINION

We have audited the financial statements of Sensational Kids Company Limited By Guarantee (the 'company') for the year ended 31 December 2020 which comprise the statement of financial activities, the balance sheet, the statement of cash flows and the notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish law and FRS 102. The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland as modified by the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" effective 1 January 2015.

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- » give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's affairs as at 31 December 2020 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, for the year then ended;
- » have been properly prepared in accordance with FRS 102 the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland; and
- » have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014.

BASIS FOR OPINION

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (Ireland) (ISAs (Ireland)) and applicable law. We are independent of the company in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of financial statements in Ireland, including the Ethical Standard issued by the Irish Auditing and Accounting Supervisory Authority (IAASA), and the provisions available for small entities, in the circumstances set out in note 28 to the financial statements, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

CONCLUSIONS RELATING TO GOING CONCERN

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the Directors' use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the company's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

Strategy for the Future

Despite the Covid-19 Pandemic, Sensational Kids stuck to its long-term vision for growth and expansion. Sensational Kids continues to be the only social enterprise in Ireland that is bridging the gap between public and private early intervention services for children with additional needs. The unique combination of subsidised clinical intervention services, access to specially chosen learning resources through the organisation's Play, Develop & Learn Store, and professional development training workshops for parents and those who work with children with additional needs, constitutes a unique holistic approach to facilitate better outcomes for children.

Since its foundation in 2007, Sensational Kids has seen a dramatic increase in the demand for its services and it is anticipated that this level of demand will continue to rise in the coming years. We intend to continue to meet the needs of our current and future service users and, in the process, help to reduce public health service waiting lists. National waiting lists for therapy remain substantial, and Sensational Kids will need to grow at a rapid rate to address this. In the last 12 months Sensational Kids has increased its social impact despite a global Pandemic.

Sensational Kids' ambition is to fully bridge the gap between public and private therapy services by providing supports to children with special needs and children in need of additional supports within 10 years, eliminating the waiting lists and financial barriers that impede access. To achieve this, the organisation needs to make such services available to a wider population within the Republic of Ireland. The organisation's goal is to significantly scale its social impact, changing the landscape for the provision of therapy services for children, eliminating therapy waiting lists and delivering transformational change for over 30,000 children in need throughout Ireland over the next 10 years.

Strategic Focus in 2020

- Sensational Kids continued with its plans to increase the capacity of the Mayo Child Development Centre, by putting plans in place to complete phase 2 of the facility fit out in 2021. We continue to seek funding to complete the final phase 3 of the fit out.
- The organisation opened its fourth provincial child development centre in Clones, Co Monaghan, completing the strategic objective to provide a child development centre in every province in Ireland
- Sensational Kids secured multi-annual funding from Rethink Ireland specifically to invest in future growth activities and became one of a select few organisations to become one of their prestigious Growth Fund Awardees
- With the support from Rethink Ireland, the organisation started the recruitment of its senior management team with the ultimate goal of scaling its social impact to support more children
- Sensational Kids put a business plan in place to custom build a 17,000 square feet child development centre and national HQ on a 2.4 acres site in Kildare, which is the organisation's most ambitious plan to date
- With the amazing and dedicated team at Sensational Kids, the future is very bright.
